What are the most frequently asked questions you encounter as an author?

People often ask me which of my books is my favorite. But my books become like my children, and just as parents say that they love all their children the same, that's how I feel about my books. There's something special to me that I love in each one of them.

Children ask if they can be the star of my next book, and I tell them: You should be the star of your own book! You can tell the story AND make yourself the main character if you want to. Best of all, you can make it end just the way you want.

They also ask me what a pun is, and a fun explanation is: A pun is using a word or words that have more than one meaning to create humor. Usually, people groan when you create puns. Try some! Here's a hint: Sometimes, the words are homonyms—words that sound the same but are spelled and mean different things. Here are some examples of puns I've seen other than those is **Burro's Tortillas**:

When it's cold, I wear a coat, but my dog just pants.

I didn't take the test because my pencil broke, so it was pointless.
